SCAT DADDY DIES AT AGE 11

cat Daddy, amid his best year at stud, collapsed and died walking out of his paddock Dec. 14 at Ashford Stud near Versailles, Ky.

The farm's notification of the 11-year-old stallion's death came via Twitter. "He was a smashing horse with a great career ahead of him," Ashford manager Dermot Ryan said, noting Scat Daddy was in good health.


Winner of the Champagne Stakes (gr. I) at 2 and Florida Derby (gr. I) at 3, the son of Johannesburg had been a top-notch stallion from the start. He led the 2011 freshman sire list and as of Dec. 13 had sired 69 stakes winners.

He ranks among the top 10 by 2015 progeny earnings and leads North American-based sires by stakes winners, stakes wins, and number of graded stakes winners (tied with Tapit at 16). His current 2-year-old crop may be his best to date as he leads the list with nine stakes winners and is second in earnings to Uncle Mo.

Scat Daddy's fee had been boosted from \$35,000 to \$100,000 for 2016. His 2015 yearlings averaged \$185,748. BH

EDITORS PICK WILLIAMS OVER 'PHAROAH'

hough respondents to a non-binding online poll overwhelmingly favored Triple Crown winner American Pharoah as Sports Illustrated's Sportsman of the Year for 2015, the magazine's editors, who had the ultimate vote, selected tennis superstar Serena Williams.

Zayat Stables' colt garnered 47% of the online votes, with World Series champion Kansas City Royals a distant second at 29%. Williams received less than 2%.

SI managing editor Christian Stone wrote that Williams was honored not only for her athletic accomplishments that included winning 53 of 56 matches and three of professional tennis' four Grand Slam events, but also "for reasons that hang in the grayer, less comfortable ether, where issues such as race and femininity collide with the games."

Predictably, the decision was criticized by many racing fans—ostensibly those who voted for American Pharoah—and the Zayat camp.

"Why have a poll if you totally ignore it? Serena failed at winning the Grand Slam. (American Pharoah is a) once-in-a-lifetime horse," Justin Zayat wrote on Twitter. His father, Ahmed, said the colt was "robbed." BH

THREE-YEAR DEAL FOR BC CHALLENGE SERIES



Preeders' Cup and NBC Sports Group Dec. 14 announced a three-year renewal of the Breeders' Cup Challenge Series the two groups introduced in 2014.

In 2016 the "Breeders' Cup Challenge Series: Win and You're In, presented by Lane's End Farm and America's Best Racing" will consist of nine telecasts on NBC and NBCSN and feature 16 "Win And You're In" races plus other major stakes on the road to the Breeders' Cup World Championships. The series will also be streamed live on NBC Sports Live Extra.

Winners of Challenge races, which combined offer more than \$10 million in purses, automatically qualify for a spot in the World Championships at Santa Anita Park Nov. 4-5 next year.

NBC Sports Group's viewership for the 2015 Challenge series increased 136% year-over-year for the nine telecasts, according to Nielsen Co.. Collectively, NBC and NBCSN averaged 936,000 viewers for the nine shows from June 13-Oct. 4, compared with the 2014 Challenge Series, which averaged 397,000. BH

HUNT, FLAT RACING HAVE CONNECTION

midst the holiday season, National Hunt racing dominates the British and Irish racing calendar. National Hunt racing has a vital link with European flat racing: Not only were many National Hunt sires high-class flat performers, but the industry offers residual value for flat-bred horses to go steeplechasing and hurdling at certain points in their careers. The Dec. 11-12 meets at Cheltenham, considered the "home of National Hunt racing," are fine examples.

Saturday's feature race, the Caspian Caviar Gold Cup (a National Hunt group III handicap chase), was won by Philip Hobbs-trained Village Vic, a son of leading National Hunt sire Old Vic (Sadler's Wells), winner of the 1989 Irish and French Derbys.

Friday's feature, the Ryman Stationery Handicap Chase (a National

Hunt group III), went to Venetia Williams-trained Aachen. A son of Rainbow Quest, the Darley-bred Aachen was listed-placed on the flat before switching codes. He is out of 1993 Park Hill Stakes (Eng-III) winner Anna of Saxony, who is also the dam of group III winner Anna Palariva. BH



TEXAS RECONSIDERS HISTORICAL RACING

he future of historical racing in Texas could be decided Dec. 15 at a regular meeting of the Texas Racing Commission, which has two new recently appointed members.

One of the new appointments is Rolando Pablos, a former TRC chairman who was named in early November. Pablos also is the new chairman, appointed by Gov. Greg Abbott after previous chairman Robert Schmidt declined Abbott's request to schedule a vote to rescind historical racing rules on the December agenda.

Schmidt has said he intended for the vote to be held in February 2016 after new commissioners were up to speed on the issue.

Texas horsemen expect a close vote Tuesday. The TRC has three options: repeal the rules; vote to republish the proposed rules for 30 days and then make a decision later, likely in February; or take no action and leave the rules in place. Even if historical racing rules survive the vote, few Texas horsemen are confident they will remain in place. BH

HAPPY NEWS FOR SAD TIMES

ow is the beginning of seasonal affective disorder (SAD) season, which Wikipedia defines as a mood disorder subset in which people with normal mental health throughout most of the year experience depressive symptoms in the winter or the summer.

Ours is a mild form of the "winter" variety, triggered by such things as the sun riding low in the southern sky and the grudging realization that we won't be spending the season in Florida any time soon. Keeping negativity in check can be a challenge.

But the key to writing racing commentary these days is in maintaining a balance between clear-eyed realism and the desire to wax positive about a sport you just can't stop loving. As legendary racing writer Joe Palmer sagely noted six decades ago, any considerable industry in which everything is all right should be stuffed and put on exhibition. History suggests there will be many future opportunities for issuing both harsh realities and sunny forecasts, thus eliminating the need to choose now between being Debbie Downer or pure Pollyanna—not

that either is flattering on a man of my years.

These days the prospect of riding our fractious world through a long, gloomy winter can usher mere moodiness into abject depression, which is why we smiled when Christopher Kay, the New York Racing Association CEO, brightened up NYRA's Dec. 9 board meeting with the news that 2015 has so far been a very safe year for horses competing at Aqueduct, Belmont Park, and Saratoga.

With about a dozen 2015

cards remaining, Kay reported that NYRA's tracks were showing a blended rate of 1.3 fatalities for every 1,000 starts. Six years' worth of data collected by The Jockey Club show a cumulative North American average of 1.9 fatalities per 1,000 starts, making NYRA's year-to-date result roughly a third lower than what currently qualifies as the industry standard.

Many have anguished at our seeming inability to reduce that number (after a 2.0 in 2009 the annual national average has since settled at 1.9). But with excellent results in two of the last three years—after four years at or near the national average—NYRA has demonstrated that real improvement in equine safety is there for the taking. (NYRA also reported 1.3 in 2013 before regressing to 1.8 last year.)

There's little doubt that the quality of NYRA's financial, equine, and human resources was instrumental in delivering this good result. While it may prove difficult for other "mainly dirt" locales to match NYRA's standard, there's no shame in reaching high. That's what a heaven's for. And sad old Earth can always use more happy news. BH


