SOGGY START FOR UNDER TACK SHOW

Two juveniles sold by Darby Dan Farm at the 2015 Keeneland September yearling sale started on a rainy first day of under tack shows for the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic sale of 2-year-olds in training.

As steady rain fell throughout the morning and early afternoon at Timonium, Md., May 17, a Shackelford colt and a Gone Astray filly tied for the top eighth-mile workout time of :10.

The Shackelford colt, Hip 6, is out of Intentional Cry, a Street Cry half sister to \$1.5-million earner Gold Mover. He is consigned by Justin Casse's Casse Sales, agent for Kinsman Farm, which bought the Ontario-bred youngster from Darby Dan at Keeneland for \$95,000.

The Gone Astray filly, Hip 185, is out of Salsa City, a Salt Lake half sister to grade II winner Runaway Dancer. Consigned by Crane Thoroughbreds, the filly, named Wrong Way Jane, was sold by Darby Dan to Harry Weisleder at Keeneland for \$19,000.

Four juveniles shared the best quarter-mile time of :21 3/5:

- Hip 85, Tybee, a New Jersey-bred filly, by Wicked Rich from the family of grade II winner Groovy Feeling, consigned by breeder Wes Carter.

- Hip 112, Lunar Eclipse, a Malibu Moon filly out of the stakes-winning Touch Gold mare Our Fantene, the dam of grade III winner Javerre. The filly was bought by consignor de Meric Sales for \$250,000 from Joe Dodgen at last year's Fasig-Tipton Kentucky July sale.

- Hip 162, a filly from the first crop of The Factor out of a half sister to grade I winner Buddy Gil. Consigned by Eddie Woods, the filly was purchased by Gainesway for \$250,000 from Morris B. Floyd and Chuck Givens at last year's Fasig-Tipton July sale.

- Hip 170, a Maryland-bred Ice Box half brother to stakes winner Bessie's Boy. Consigned by Ciaran Dunne's Wavertree, the colt was bought by Takin' Chances for \$30,000 from Paramount Sales at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic October yearling sale.

Despite the rain the surface remained in good shape throughout the breeze show and maintenance crews did not have to seal it, according to Paget Bennett, Fasig-Tipton Midlantic sales director.

"This track can hold a lot of moisture, and the rain we got today was manageable because it was steady," Bennett said.

Consignor Clovis Crane of Crane Thoroughbreds said because of the precipitation the times for horses that worked during the first set were noticeably slower than the times for the later sets.

"The first set horses were really hindered," Crane said.

The under tack show continues through May 19 at 8 a.m. EDT daily. The sale will be held May 23-24 at 10 a.m. daily. **BH**

RAIN NOT A CONCERN: O'NEILL

Doug O'Neill said he's not worried about the prospect of rain as Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (gr. I) winner Nyquist heads toward the May 21 Preakness Stakes (gr. I).

Weather.com forecasts a 100% chance of rain at Pimlico Race Course for Saturday, and Nyquist's chief rival for the second leg of the Triple Crown, Derby runner-up Exaggerator, proved in the Santa Anita Derby (gr. I) April 9 how much he loves a wet surface.

But O'Neill said he has no concern about either safety—should the rain arrive—or his horse's ability to adapt.

"We've seen the amount of rain the Pimlico track has taken, and the track continues to bounce back," O'Neill said. "The track crew is doing a great job.

"We've seen that Nyquist can handle a bit of weather at Churchill Downs. The Florida Derby (gr. I), it rained pretty good too. He's a sure-footed horse. Whatever the weather will be, I think he'll show up and run his race."

With the threat of early morning rain looming over Baltimore, O'Neill sent Nyquist out to gallop at 6:08 a.m. EDT May 17 rather than his planned 8:30 a.m. start.

Under regular exercise rider Jonny Garcia, the undefeated son of Uncle Mo jogged clockwise to the finish line, turned, and galloped a lap, picking up the pace at the half-mile pole for about 1 1/2 miles worth of exercise.

Exaggerator went out on the track at 7:45 a.m. He began with an eighth-mile jog before breaking off into his gallop.

"He looked nice and limber," said trainer Keith Desormeaux.

"I thought he floated over the track. It looks like he adapted to the surface real well. That's about his normal speed, so I wouldn't consider it aggressive. It was a typical gallop for him, but it was very nice."

Nyquist has beaten Exaggerator every time they have raced each other, but Desormeaux believes the short turnaround following the Kentucky Derby could play to his advantage.

"The strongest attribute Exaggerator has is his ability to recover," Desormeaux said. "Nyquist, I think the goal was to keep him fresh by only running twice this year, but maybe that'll backfire."

Gun Runner, third in the Derby, was officially taken out of consideration for the Preakness May 17.

"We're going to continue to train at Churchill and plan on a serious summer of 3-year-old races with him," trainer Steve Asmussen said. "He's been in tremendous physical condition going into the Derby and coming out of it, and we expect him to continue to physically develop."

Three Preakness runners—Collected, Laoban, and Uncle Lino—arrived at Pimlico on the afternoon of May 17 after taking a flight from Louisville, Ky. **BH**

PREAKNESS CONFIRMED FOR ABIDING STAR

The lifting of an equine herpesvirus quarantine at Parx Racing means Abiding Star will take his shot at the May 21 Preakness Stakes (gr. I).

Connections of the dual stakes-winning Uncle Mo colt, who is based at Parx, were relieved to get the all clear May 17 when the Pennsylvania track's quarantine, in place since April 1, was lifted.

Abiding Star, the winner of five straight races, will ship to Pimlico Race Course May 19.

"I felt quite confident that was going to happen, but, hey, stranger things have gone on," said trainer Ned Allard of the lifted quarantine. "So often you take chances with horses that haven't really done anything that special but won one or two races, but this horse has a lot of confidence in himself.

"He's coming off a string of good races—winning races—and I'm sure his confidence level is about as high as it's going to get. Now you need the talent, never mind the confidence."

After winning the Private Terms Stakes at Laurel Park March 12, Allard and owner/breeder Gilbert Campbell of Stonehedge Farm supplemented Abiding Star as a \$6,000 late nomination to the Triple Crown. They planned to run in the April 9 Federico Tesio with a "Win and You're In" berth to the Preakness on the line but got caught in the quarantine.

Abiding Star won an April 12 Parx allowance going a mile and 70 yards by 8 3/4 lengths and took the Parx Derby wire-to-wire at the same distance

by 1 3/4 lengths. He will face his greatest challenge against undefeated Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (gr. I) winner Nyquist and runner-up Exaggerator.

"If the only horses that ran were (odds of) 8-5, racing would be a little boring," Allard said. "We're going to take our chances and see if he can face the monsters."

J.D. Acosta has the mount in the Preakness.

Pimlico will isolate Abiding Star and another Allard runner, Sagamore Spirit Maryland Sprint Stakes (gr. III) contender Always Sunshine, in temporary stalls on the racetrack's backstretch, far from the stakes barns housing the other Preakness and undercard stakes contenders. Although neither horse showed signs of illness during the quarantine, as a safety precaution they will also be required to train at 5 a.m. ET, before other horses are on the racetrack.

Allard said he's not concerned about the weather despite a 100% chance of rain in the forecast.

"That doesn't hurt our chances: both horses have run very well on off racetracks, so that shouldn't hinder them," he remarked. "Always Sunshine is doing awfully good, too, so it should be a fun weekend." **BH**

LOSING MOUNT FEES INCREASED IN KENTUCKY

The Kentucky Horse Racing Commission May 17 approved a new agreement that will see losing mount fees increased on the state's lower-purse races.

Losing mount fees—the amount paid to riders who finish out of the top four spots—will go up \$10 for most Kentucky races.

In races with purses up to \$9,999, the losing mount fee will go from \$50 to \$60; races between \$10,000-\$14,999 go from \$55 to \$65; \$15,000-\$24,999 from \$60 to \$70; and \$25,000-\$49,999 increase from \$70 to \$80. Races of \$50,000 to \$99,000 stay at \$85, and races of \$100,000 or more stay at \$110.

"We were happy that the parties were able to come together and reach an agreement on losing mount fees for the time being in Kentucky that will benefit our riders with an increase," said Jockeys' Guild general counsel Mindy Coleman.

Yourdreamsormine and Delta Bluesman tied for this past week's top Equibase Speed Figure of 114, but the two Florida-breds ultimately saw different results on the track.

N.T.S. Stable's Yourdreamsormine drew off in the stretch to score a three-length win in the May 13 \$75,000 Bull Gator Stakes for Florida-breds going seven furlongs on the main track at Gulfstream Park.

Trained by Milton Wolfson and ridden by Emisael Jaramillo, Yourdreamsormine (Mr. Sekiguchi) earned

a career-best ESF in nailing down his second career stakes win.

Monster Racing Stables' Delta Bluesman (Wagon Limit) led every step to reach the wire first ahead of A.P. Indian in the \$74,500 Decathlon Stakes going six furlongs May 14 at Monmouth Park, but the apparent winner was disqualified. The stewards placed Delta Bluesman and jockey Jonathan Gonzales last after determining they had crowded foes by coming over early from their outside post in the field of five.

While the ultimate result proved frustrating for his connections, including trainer Jorge Navarro, Delta Bluesman did earn a career-best ESF in the Decathlon. **BH**

PATHFORK MAKES GREAT START

Highlands Stud stallion Pathfork is currently South Africa's leading first-crop sire.

Distorted Humor's Kentucky-bred son—winner of the boylesports.com Vincent O'Brien National Stakes (Ire-I) in 2010—has had five winners from 13 juvenile runners to date.

Pathfork, whose runners include unbeaten Godolphin Barb Stakes (SAf-III) winner Red Chesnut Road and Epol Dahlia Plate runner-up Turbo, heads the first-crop sires list ahead of Gimmethegreenlight (More Than Ready), with former Gardiner Farms sire Philanthropist (Kris S.) in third.

One of two sons of Distorted Humor at stud in South Africa (Flower Alley being the other), Pathfork is a half brother to ill-fated Birdstone Stakes and Temperance Hill Invitational Stakes winner Tacticus (A.P. Indy).

His dam, Visions of Clarity (Sadler's Wells), is a stakes-winning half sister to multiple group/grade I

winner Spinning World, and his fifth dam is blue hen Best in Show.

Philanthropist has made a pleasing start with his first South African runners: seven of his 13 starters have won or finished in the frame. **BH**

IMAGES OF THE 1966 PREAKNESS

Fifty years ago Kauai King became the first—and only—Maryland-bred to win the Kentucky Derby. Mike Ford's son of Native Dancer followed that up with a 1 3/4-length score in the Preakness Stakes (gr. I) at Pimlico.

INTRIGUING CROSS IN UNIFIED'S PEDIGREE

Candy Ride's son Gun Runner came into the Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (gr. I) as winner of the Veterans Ford Risen Star Stakes (gr. II) and TwinSpires.com Louisiana Derby (gr. II), his only two starts of 2016. He produced a fine effort at Churchill Downs, tracking the fast early pace in company with Nyquist before moving to take command at the head of the stretch. Gun Runner's exertions took their toll soon after, but he battled gamely to hold on to third.

Gun Runner won't be present in the Preakness Stakes (gr. I), but if Nyquist makes it to the Belmont Stakes (gr. I) with the Triple Crown on the line, another talented Candy Ride 3-year-old might be his toughest opponent. This is Centennial Farms' Unified, who won a traditional Belmont prep, the May 14 Peter Pan Stakes (gr. II), in his third career start.

Unified had also emerged successfully in his only two previous starts, leading throughout to win a six-furlong Gulfstream Park maiden in 1:08.95 in February, and again making all when capturing the Bay Shore Stakes (gr. III) at Aqueduct Racetrack in April.

Gun Runner and Unified are from the eighth crop of Candy Ride, whose other graded scorers in 2016 include Grand Tito, Chocolate Ride, and Eagle. Candy Ride's sons are also having an impact. Twirling Candy has already produced five stakes winners from his first crop, including Danzing Candy, who won the San Felipe Stakes (gr. II) and set the early fractions in the Kentucky Derby, and Investec Epsom Derby (gr. I) possible

Viren's Army. Two other sons of Candy Ride, Sidney's Candy and Misremembered, also have first crop 3-year-old stakes winners this year.

Unified is out of stakes-placed Union City, a daughter of fast-emerging broodmare sire Dixie Union. Dam also of stakes-placed sprinter Honkeytonk Man, Union City is a sister to Dixie City, who captured the Demoiselle Stakes (gr. II) as a 2-year-old.

The second dam, the Carson City mare City Sister, earned a graded-stakes placing in the seven-furlong Nassau County Breeders' Cup

Stakes (gr. II) and is a three-quarter sister to Withers Stakes (gr. II) scorer Fast Decision. The third dam, Demi Souer, is a Storm Bird half sister to champion 2-year-old male Dehere and is bred on the same cross as Storm Cat, a horse who has done very well under Candy Ride.

Unified is the only stakes winner for Can-

dy Ride out of a Dixieland Band-line mare, but a more interesting connection in the pedigree is with Carson City. Candy Ride is a Mr. Prospector-line horse out of a mare by a stallion bred on a Blushing Groom/Northern Dancer cross, and Carson City is a Mr. Prospector son out of a mare bred on a Blushing Groom/Northern Dancer cross. **BH**
